EASTERN REGIONAL HISTORY



2019-2020

Program Year

When Marion Stubbs Thomas shared her intention to develop a club that would bring their children together in a close social and cultural relationship, it was met with great enthusiasm from her family and friends. Since there were more children than a home could comfortably accommodate, the children met once a month at the Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA). It soon became necessary to make special plans for each gathering; therefore, the mothers deemed it wise to have a "Mothers" Meeting for this purpose. Such was the humble beginning in South Philadelphia.

1939-1940, 1944 (New York and Washington, D.C.)

The second Jack and Jill group to organize was the New York Chapter in 1939. The Washington, DC Chapter was started by Marguerite Green in March 1940. Four years later, the success of Jack and Jill programs in Washington, Philadelphia, and New York picked up momentum. The enthusiasm and interest in the concept of such an organization began to spread.

1945 (Buffalo, New York)

Following the shadows of Pittsburgh, a group of mothers of Buffalo, New York were nurturing the same idea. The first group of prospective Jack and Jill members met in September 1945 to organize. The charter membership of twelve elected Edna Seay as their first Chapter President.

1948

The Eastern Region expansion had been phenomenal from the beginning and now Atlantic City, New Jersey and Springfield, Massachusetts were being added to the roster. Nathalie Johnson initiated the move to organize the North Jersey Chapter. The North Jersey Chapter officially joined the National Organization in June 1950. Because of the rural aspects of North Jersey, it was impossible to limit membership to a particular town; instead it was limited to a mileage radius.

1944 (Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania)

Toki Schalk Johnson, presented to a group of Pittsburgh mothers the idea of forming a similar club. Marjorie Butler became Pittsburgh's first president. Under her capable guidance began one of the most successful chapters of Jack and Jill.

1944-1946

The Eastern Region tentacles were in a continuous growth pattern during this three year period with the chartering of chapters in Baltimore, Maryland and Boston, Massachusetts. A national organization committee was mobilized representing these seven Eastern Region chapters and three additional chapters in the Mid-Atlantic, Central and Mid-Western Regions. The committee met in Philadelphia on June, 1946 to make plans for bringing these groups together as one body.









2000s

In 2011 and 2013, the Regional Mothers Conference was held on a cruise to Bermuda. In 2015, the Regional Mothers Conference was held at the Atlantis Resort in the Bahamas and had record attendance. The On the Hill Summit was held in the Eastern Region in 2009, 2011, 2013, 2015 and 2017 in Washington, DC. In 2012, the region was the host of the 40th Biennial National Convention in Philadelphia, PA, which marked the beginning celebration of the 75th Anniversary of Jack and Jill of America, Inc. Over 350 members of the Eastern region commemorated the 50th Anniversary of the March on Washington in August 2013. Our children proudly carried our banner and marched for education, healthcare, gun control, voting rights, and Trayvon Martin. At the 2014 National Convention, the body approved the Western Maryland Chapter and also elected Tammy King, from the Eastern Region's Bergen Passaic, NJ chapter as National President.

At the 2016 National Convention, the Greater Suburban Maryland Chapter and the Western Massachusetts Chapter were approved as provisional chapters. At the 2018 National Convention, Danielle Brown of the Loudoun County, VA Chapter was elected National President and the Greater Pocono, PA Provisional Chapter and the Nation's Capital Provisional Chapter were approved.

Our Regional theme for 2015-2019 was "Empowering Families for SUCCESS!", under the leadership of two-term Eastern Regional Director Mondi Kumbula-Fraser. Under the Kumbula Fraser administration the region held Regional Voter Registration Drives that registered thousands of voters, hosted Town Halls on "Race, Civil Liberties and Law Enforcement", launched the Junior Gazette (a quarterly publication for children and teens), introduced a Regional Racial Identity Kit, introduced Gavel Clubs (affiliate of Toastmasters for children under age 18) in chapters, held 3 annual Regional MLK, Jr. Days of Service, collected thousands of books for children in need, had record attendance at Regional events and more. The Eastern Region is the largest region in the country. In 2016, we grew to 57 Chapters with the addition of the Greater Suburban Maryland and the Western Massachusetts Chapters. In 2018, we grew to 59 chapters with the addition of the Greater Pocono, PA Chapter and the Nation's Capital Chapter in Washington, DC.

Our Regional Conference in July 2019 was held in Jamaica, West Indies with approximately 600 members, children, teens, fathers and Associates in attendance. Melinda Alexis-Hayes was elected Eastern Regional Director. The region will continue with the theme "Empowering Families for SUCCESS!" incorporating five regional programmatic thrusts: Social Justice Empowerment, Economic Empowerment, Empowerment through the Arts, Empowerment through Mental Health, and Empowerment for our future (strategic operations and strategic planning) to guide our future while reflecting on our history in this country dating back to August 1619.

1951

The Eastern region resurfaced with the addition of the Lincoln University, Pennsylvania Chapter.

To Dorothy Wright of Philadelphia, the first National President, we owe our appreciation for guiding us through the difficult period of organization. Further, under the leadership of Emile Pickens of New York, Second National President, marked progress was made toward the realization of Jack and Jill objectives. Edna Seay of Buffalo, our Third National President served in the capacity of national officer since its inception and guided and directed the group wisely and efficiently to the place we assume in our communities today. The Eastern Region owes gratitude to Ida Murphy Smith of Baltimore for her high standards as Editor of the first edition of UP THE HILL; Helen Prattis of Pittsburgh and Vernice Wynn of Baltimore for the wonderful and difficult job they performed in the capacity of Secretary/ Treasurer. It was necessary for all of the chapters to seek advice and grateful thanks were echoed for the guidance given by Sara Scott of Philadelphia, Program Chairman.

The idea of a regional plan for the National Organization was first advanced at the 3rd annual meeting of Jack and Jill of America Inc., held in Washington, D.C. in 1948. It was suggested that three regions (East, Midwest and West) be established to (1) shorten the travel time to annual meetings; (2) allow more time for discussions and (3) allow the inclusion of children at the meetings. For several years, a regional organizational plan was discussed during annual national conventions. These discussions were fueled by a hugely successful Teen regional conference organized and hosted by the Philadelphia Chapter in June 1951 around the year's program year of study and research on Haiti.

At the 1957 National Convention held in San Francisco, the Regional Plan of the Organization was finally adopted and Regional Directors were appointed or elected. The first Regional meetings were held in 1959, and the decision was made to alternate years between the Regional and National conventions. Hence, each is held every two years. Currently, the organization is divided into seven regions—Central, Eastern, Far West, Mid-Atlantic, Mid-Western, South Central and Southeastern. Each of the seven regions has four officers—Regional Director, Regional Treasurer, Regional Secretary, and Foundation Member-At-Large, who are responsible for providing continuity between the National Executive Board and the chapters in the respective regions. The Regional Officers are elected during the Biennial Regional Conferences, which convene on the odd numbered years following the National Convention.

Regional teen conferences are held annually. The first teen conference was held in Philadelphia, PA, in June 1951. Each Region has teen officers who are elected annually at the Teen Conferences.. The region is proud to have launched in 2006 mandatory certification training for Teen Conference chaperones to assure clear expectations and a safe experience for our teens.

CHAPTER MISSION & HISTORY

The Nassau County Chapter of Jack and Jill of America, Incorporated received its charter on **October 25**, **1958**. The ceremony and installation of 39 charter members took place at Patricia Murphy's Restaurant in Manhasset, New York. National Officers participating in the program were Emile Pickens, Second National Vice President, and Burma Whitted, National Program Director. The Chapter was the 97th Chapter chartered by the National Organization, and was sponsored by the Queens Chapter.

Since its formation in **1958**, the Nassau County Chapter has had an extensive history of dedication and commitment to all children. Through our age-targeted service and program initiatives, we encourage philanthropic awareness in our children through community service and outreach, with fundraising efforts directed at local, national and international programs that better the lives of children around the world.

The Nassau County Chapter is focused on our Children, our Chapter and our Community. This is in keeping with our National organization's mission statement: Jack and Jill of America, Incorporated is a membership organization of mothers with children ages 2-19, dedicated to nurturing future African American leaders by strengthening children through leadership development, volunteer service, philanthropic giving and civic duty.

In **1969**, the Nassau County Chapter served as host of the Mothers' Regional Conference, "Preparation for Black Youth", from October 17-19 at the Garden City Hotel.

Recognizing the need to support local charities, the Nassau County Chapter was instrumental in introducing legislation that resulted in the JJOA Foundation receiving half of the proceeds from local fundraisers, with local charities receiving the other half. During the **1978** National Convention, Charlotte Brown was instrumental in getting legislation passed that allowed local chapters to keep two-thirds of all funds raised for local charities before sending one-third to foundation.

Nassau County Chapter has consistently awarded annual college scholarships for scholastic excellence and financial need to non-Jack and Jill students in our community. In **1988**, the chapter awarded its first Artistic Scholarship in the area of music. The chapter has supported various national projects, including Jack and Jill's National Service Projects, the Legal Aid Fund of the N.A.A.C.P., the National Medical Foundation, Save the Children, Africare, Klan Watch, United Negro Scholarship Fund, UNICEF, The Boys and Girls Clubs, and March of Dimes.

Local organizations supported by the Nassau County Chapter over the years include: Ujama Academy, Lakeview Public Library, The Association for the Help of Retarded Children, N.A.A.C.P. Life Membership, Sickle Cell Anemia Project, M.L.K. Center, Inc., David Womack Fund, and the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Birthday Celebration Committee of Nassau County, Inc. Funds to support these projects were raised at the renowned Luncheon and Fashion Show and Dinner Dance sponsored by the chapter.

Nassau County was the proud host of the **1996** Eastern Region Teen Conference, which was held on March 29th - 31st at the Melville Marriot Hotel in Melville, New York. The Teen Conference attracted over 1,200 teens from the Eastern Region and Europe. An innovative feature of this conference was the introduction of **POPS** (Parents **on Patrol Squad**). POPS was responsible for security and general safety of all the youth and parent participants throughout the conference.

During the **2000-2001** program year the Nassau County Chapter was the proud recipient of a \$5,000 New York State Legislative Grant from Assemblywoman Earlene Hill Hooper for the MAGIC (Making A Good Intelligent Choice) Program for local youth.

At the 2000 Regional Teen Conference, our very own Kimberly Mack was elected Eastern Region Teen Secretary.

During the **2001** Regional Teen Conference, the Nassau County Chapter was the proud recipient of three awards: 1st Place-Chapter Banner, 2nd Place-Chapter T-Shirt, and 3rd Place Chapter Display.







In **2002**, the Nassau County Chapter received a 1st Place award from the Regional Member-at-Large for being the chapter with the largest contribution to the National Foundation during the **2001-2002** program year.

In **2003**, the Chapter was the honored recipient of the Jacqueline Robinson Regional Competition Grant of \$3,000 to be used in support of the MAGIC Program. In addition, during the **2003** Regional Teen Conference, the Nassau County Chapter was the proud recipient of the award for 1st Place- Chapter Banner. Our own Jon-Claude Alexander was the 2nd Place winner of the Regional Teen Oratorical Competition- Division 1.

On February 28, **2004** Nassau County celebrated its 45th Anniversary with a Harlem Renaissance Ball at Carlyle on the Green in Bethpage. The honoree was Paul Mercer Ellington, grandson of Duke Ellington. The evening included a performance by the Duke Ellington Orchestra. Over 375 guests, dressed in roaring 1920's attire, were in attendance and the event raised funds for the Jack & Jill Foundation, Long Island Fund for Women & Girls, Mentoring Partnership of Long Island and Nassau Partnership of After School Education.

The chapter developed a Charter Associates group in **2004** and today the Nassau County Chapter Associates group is 33 members strong. The Associates sponsor the chapter's oratorical workshops and oratorical contest for our Jacks and Jills every year. The Associates also provide invaluable support at the annual Teen Leadership Summit, which is our signature chapter service project. The Associates not only volunteer their time at the Teen Summit, but they also provide a scholarship awarded to one of the day's attendees.

In **2005** the Charter **Father's Auxiliary** group was established. The Father's Auxiliary group hosts the Young Investors group for our tweens, teaching them fiscal responsibility. The fathers also do a private session with our teen boys at the annual teen retreat.

In **2005**, the Nassau County Chapter renamed our scholarship fund, the **Alicia Ashby-Boyd Memorial Scholarship Fund**, to commemorate the vibrant life of our dearly departed mother, Alicia Diane Ashby-Boyd. This scholarship is awarded annually to deserving African-American Nassau County students and is earmarked for unmet needs that are not covered by grants, financial aid, or other scholarships.

As the Nassau County Chapter approached its Golden Anniversary, in **2008**, the Chapter celebrated the occasion with two special events. The celebration commenced with an Art and Jazz Brunch on October 14, 2007 at the Carltun, featuring African-American artists and a jazz band led by our very own Jack and Jill father, Kirk Bailey, on saxophone. Our formal 50th Anniversary Gala was held on March 14, 2009 at the Cradle of Aviation Museum in Garden City, NY with almost 500 guests in attendance. The theme "Saluting our Past, Honoring Our Present and Embracing Our Future" provided the focus on our national aims while acknowledging our history and preparing for the years ahead. With all of the mothers dressed beautifully in gold, we proudly celebrated 50 years as the Nassau County Chapter. A picture of the chapter members would be taken in the form of a number 50. In celebration of our 50th year, the mothers of the chapter elected to fund full-tuition scholarships to local colleges on Long Island - one to Nassau Community College for two years and the other to SUNY Old Westbury College for four years. Additional monies raised were donated to both the Hempstead and Glen Cove Boys and Girls Clubs.

In **2009**, as the recipient of a grant from the Jack and Jill Foundation, the Nassau County Chapter developed a Teen Leadership Summit, "**Molding the Future: Cultivating Young Minds, for Community Teens.**" Held in partnership with SUNY Old Westbury, this event was provided to high school students (grades 9-12) throughout Nassau County at no charge to attendees. The goal of the Teen Leadership Summit is to help students develop the skills needed to navigate through the high school years and move successfully through college or other endeavors. It offered a unique opportunity for over 100 local high school students to develop a personal sense of the responsibility necessary for success in high school, while developing leadership skills and preparing for college. The Teen Summit was one of the largest community partnership projects that the chapter had ever undertaken and the range of involvement was diverse. The one-day program includes workshops delivered by guest speakers as well as chapter moms and dads, on subjects such as leadership development, financial literacy, time management, presentation and interviewing skills, teen relationships, the college admissions process, financial aid, and career exploration. This annual Teen Leadership Summit is now in its tenth year and has expanded to include career academies in business and medicine as well as parent workshops that provide useful







information to parents to assist and support their teen children.

On **November 20, 2009**, the chapter would host Parents' Night Out: An Evening of Denim & Diamonds at the DeSeversky Mansion in Old Westbury. Having focused on our children and children in the community, the chapter decided to make the event not just a night out for Jack and Jill parents, but also for parents in the community. This has become an annual signature event.

In March **2010**, the Nassau County Chapter was the proud host of the Eastern Region's 60th Teen Conference in New York City. As expected, the Nassau County mothers, Associates and Fathers expended an enormous amount of time and energy to ensure that the event was a tremendous success. The attendees warmly received the event, which attracted over 900 teens.

At the **2011** Regional Conference Cruise to Bermuda, The Nassau County Chapter was a winner once again. Thanks to our Grade K – 2 Group 'Toy Story' activity, we were chosen as one of the chapters that exceeded all programmatic categories for quality. Also in **2011**, the chapter went "green" - no more handouts at chapter meetings, as all items were now presented electronically.

On **October 29, 2012,** Super Storm Sandy swept through Nassau County, New York causing much devastation. Many chapter members sustained significant damage to their homes and vehicles; some were even displaced. In true sisterhood, members pitched in to help, not only each other, but also the community at large, through food, clothing and toiletry drives. Even with the setbacks of this natural disaster, the Nassau County Chapter was able to submit an award-winning chapter handbook that year.

Our Black Diamonds **55**th **Anniversary** Gala Benefit was held on **November 23, 2013,** at Carlyle on the Green at Bethpage State Park, Bethpage, New York. The event honored shining stars that have made significant contributions in STEM related careers. Funds raised would support the Jack & Jill Foundation and the National organization's partnership with the National Black Cardiologists Association. The proceeds raised from this benefit earned us the distinction of being recognized at the **2014 National Convention** as a top contributor to the Jack & Jill of America Foundation.

Nassau County Chapter teens won the third place award for the chapter banner at the **63rd Eastern Region Teen Conference** in **2013.** On **April 26, 2013,** the teens hosted their annual Spring Teen Dance at the African American Museum in Hempstead, New York raising more than \$2,000 that would support the Jack & Jill Foundation and victims of Hurricane Sandy.

At the **64th Eastern Region Teen Conference** on **May 1-4, 2014** in Washington, DC, Nassau County teen Carla Magnus was elected Regional Teen Treasurer. For the year **2014-2015**, we were proud to have a chapter first - a mother and daughter on the Eastern Regional Team together, as Nassau County mother Paula Magnus served as the Eastern Region Secretary.

In June of **2014**, we experienced the loss of a beloved mother and member, Stephanie Margetson - Chapter Chaplain. While the loss was difficult for the chapter, we bonded together for the two children and husband left in our care, as Stephanie would have wanted. With this loss, we pay tribute to the legacy of sisterhood Stephanie left with us. We began **2014-2015** with the theme of "Sisters", in Stephanie's honor. As we continue to work and live together, we remain committed to strengthening our sisterhood. In this spirit, in 2014 Chapter President Racquel Oden created a new chapter logo consisting of an infinity symbol with the word "sisterhood" integrated into it. The logo subsequently formed the basis of the design of a chapter pin that was given out at our **May 2015** chapter installation.

During the summer of **2014** the teens hosted their first Teen White Party on the Vineyard. This event was an instant success and has grown to an annual event with over 400 teens in attendance at the **2017** Teen White Party at Lola's. Through this signature event the teens have supported the Jack & Jill of America Foundation and other local charities including the Mary Brennan Inn, The Cottagers and the Martha's Vineyard YMCA.

In January 2015, the chapter hosted its seventh annual Teen Leadership Summit. While local politicians have provided







support by attending and participating in Teen Summit in previous years, for the first time in **2015**, the chapter received financial support from The Nassau County District Attorney's office to cover transportation costs for attendees as well as supplies and materials. The District Attorney's Office continues to serve as a sponsor of this program. On January 6, 2018

we will host our tenth annual Teen Leadership Summit at Adelphi University, with whom we formed a partnership in 2016, after relocating the program from SUNY Old Westbury.

At the **65**th **Annual Teen Conference**, in **April 2015**, our teens demonstrated that they have the "Power to Make a Difference." Ksayla Wallace was elected Regional Teen Foundation Chair. We said a beautiful goodbye to an amazing outgoing Regional Teen Treasurer, Carla Magnus. We won 1st Place for- Display, 1st Place- Scrapbook and 1st Place-Visual. Our teens walked away with individual accolades as well. Kristen McKenzie won the Distinguished Teen Award, Kiara Powell won the Senior Academic Award and Carla Magnus won the Community Service Award.

At the **66th Annual Teen Conference**, in **April 2016**, **Nassau** County teens received numerous accolades. Jada Thorne was proudly elected the new Regional Teen Vice President. Lauren Thomas was awarded the Freshman Academic Award for Distinguished Scholastic Merit. Jourdin Thomas and Katherine Hibbert were both recipients of the Academic Award for Distinguished Scholastic Merit. Carla Magnus was the Carole Robertson Medal Recipient and she received the Teen Community Service Award. Carla also placed 3rd for the Carole Robertson Scholarship and was awarded \$500 for her years of service to the community through Jack and Jill. We also won 3rd Place for - Best Overall Display.

In **2016**, our Teens were awarded a \$3,000 Jacqueline Robinson Grant from the Jack and Jill Foundation to implement their teen project, Teen CEO. On March 10, **2017** the teens hosted their first Teen CEO Shark Tank competition at Molloy College. With the support and guidance of our teen advisors and associates the teens were able to execute this phenomenal program. This shark-tank inspired business pitch competition encouraged and fostered entrepreneurship amongst our African-American teens in Nassau County. The student teams from participating schools attended workshops to discuss steps to building a business with current business owners. The teams worked together to brainstorm a business idea and develop a pitch that was presented to a team of judges that included chapter alumni, local business leaders and chapter dads. Monetary prizes were awarded to the top three teams. This program was extremely well received.

On May 5th, **2018** we celebrated our 6oth Anniversary at the Cradle of Aviation with a Black and White Masquerade Ball. The magical evening honored Susan L. Taylor, Founder and CEO, National Cares Mentoring Movement and Editor-In-Chief Emerita, Essence Magazine. The Community and Civic Engagement award was presented to Dr. J. Hamil Willoughby, DDS for his outstanding contribution to the Long Island Community.

Among the guests were Nassau County Chapter's own mothers and fathers alongside other invited guest from neighboring chapters and the surrounding communities. The night was a picture of elegance, celebrating our chartering in 1958.

Guests arrived in all Black attire as we transformed the Cradle of Aviation into our masquerade anniversary gala. Jack and Jill of Nassau County is embedded in the fabric of Nassau County. The evening commemorated the occasion with style and grace as we dined amongst the Great Exhibits and Planetarium in the aerospace museum.

Proceeds benefited The Jack and Jill Nassau County Chapter Alicia Ashby-Boyd Memorial Scholarship Fund, The Jack and Jill of America Foundation, Inc. and a \$5,000 donation to The National CARES Mentoring Movement, founded by Susan L. Taylor.

In the **2018-2019** program year, the Nassau County Chapter hosted the Metropolitan Mother's Workday Cluster on Saturday, November 10th at the Hyatt Regency in New Brunswick, NJ. It was truly an all hands-on deck experience as the cluster chairs, Iyeesha Cook, Dionne Hansen-Sexton and the entire chapter worked diligently to bring this momentous event into fruition. From the Friday Night Wine Down, to the swag bag donations, to the beautiful table decorations no detail was left undone. Our special JJNC touches were felt, acknowledged and appreciated. Our coordinated denim wrap dresses were extremely well received as they added greater visibility and uniformity.







The agenda included guidance on how to better integrate the Gavel Club's Oratorical Training and the Regional Racial Identity Kit Program into the fabric of your chapter's programming. The chapter worked closely with the region to plan impactful and relevant workshops for the over 600 mothers, teens and middle schoolers in attendance. The chapter coordinated a powerful Town Hall discussion moderated by TV reporter AJ Calloway entitled "Living While Black." In addition to hosting, Nassau County's own Jack, Chandler Perry, won the Metropolitan Cluster Oratorical Competition. The theme was "Black by Popular Demand." He delivered his powerful award-winning speech during the luncheon and we were so incredibly proud of him. He went on to represent the Metropolitan Cluster at the Eastern Region Teen Conference where he won the grand prize. This was truly an exciting moment for our chapter and the realization of the empowering impact that Gavel Club has on our Jacks and Jills.

Nassau County won big on the regional level with Chapter President Melissa Desravines being elected Regional Treasurer during the Eastern Regional Mothers Conference in Montego Bay, Jamaica, July 24th-28th. The chapter was recognized and won the 2nd Place Community Service Award for "High Five for Hands-On Service". The chapter was also recognized for outstanding programming that encompassed all of the regional initiatives, i.e. Mental Health and Awareness, Literacy and Fueling the Body (Feeding the Hungry).

The current administration includes Dionne Hansen-Sexton, President; Patricia Cooper, Vice President, Adsonia Montgomery-Lewis, Program Director, Tamra Walker, Recording Secretary, Natalie Nelson, Corresponding Secretary, Lorraine Aycock, Treasurer, Brandi Walker-Wege, Financial Secretary, and Kimberly L. Thomas, Editor. Immediate past officers Melissa Desravines, President, Dionne Hansen-Sexton, Vice President, Jamise Valentine, Corresponding Secretary, and Erica Valestin, Treasurer.

For the 2019-2020 program year the Nassau County Chapter will strive to deliver impactful programming for our Jacks and Jills and our community. We will also be continuing many of our signature programs including the Teen Leadership Summit, Denim & Diamonds and our many service initiatives. 

COMMITTEE DESCRIPTIONS

Budget – The Chairperson of the Budget Committee will be the Treasurer and one representative from each age group. The Budget committee makes sure National, Regional and local financial obligations are included in the budget. A financial report should be submitted at the September Mothers' meeting. The budget shall be presented at the January meeting and approved by the majority vote of those present and voting at the March meeting.

Constitution – This committee is composed of a chairperson who is the Parliamentarian and one person from each age group. This committee shall abide by the laws as set forth by National.

Nominating – This committee shall be formed prior to the January meeting and one member from each age-group shall serve on the committee. The chairperson for the nominating committee shall be the member who receives the highest number of overall votes to the committee. The committee shall prepare a slate of officers for the presentation at the January meeting. Voting will take place at the April meeting (no later than April 30th). Installation of officers shall take place at the May meeting (no later than May 31st)

Courtesy – This committee is composed of a chairperson appointed by the President and one representative from each age group. Responsibilities – Each representative shall notify chairperson of all illnesses, etc., including children of all age groups. The chairperson will send courtesies whenever needed. Welcome new members. Provide refreshments at Mothers' Meetings.

Program – The program committee will consist of the Program Director who will serve as chairperson and one representative from each age group. Responsibilities – Responsible for developing chapter programs. Plan an activity for National Jack and Jill Day. Prepare lists of names of children entering groups.

Fundraising – The chairperson of this committee may volunteer however, if there is no volunteer it shall be the duty of the President to appoint a chairperson. In the event that the President does not appoint a chairperson, then the chapter will elect a chairperson. A person from each age group will work on this committee.

Technology - The Technology Committee is appointed by the President. This committee is responsible for identifying ways that the chapter can better utilize technology for chapter efficiency and communication. This committee is also tasked with assisting with presentations at chapter meetings and programs.

Tellers Committee - Tellers Duties include administering the election process using secret ballots, counting all properly cast ballots, reporting election results to the Presiding Officer, and preparing a written report of the election process, including results, for submission to the Recording Secretary.

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CHAPTER BYLAWS

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Nassau County Chapter of Jack and Jill of America, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES AND AIMS

- A. The objectives of this organization are:
 - To create a medium of contact for children, which will stimulate growth and development;
 - To provide for children constructive, educational, cultural, civic, recreational, health and social programs.
- B. The aims of this organization are:
 - To aid mothers in learning more about their children through careful study;
 - To seek for all children the same advantages which we desire for our own;
 - To support all national legislation aimed at bettering conditions of all children.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Members

A. Members shall be limited to mothers, legal guardians, or female custodial caretakers of children between the ages of two (2) years and through the nineteenth (19) year who are legal residents of Nassau County.

- B. To maintain a membership, a member must be in good standing. Good standing as used in this document means a member must be active and financial. Active is defined as participating in local chapter activities, sponsoring age-group activities and supporting the Foundation. A member in good standing shall be required to attend one (1) national convention or one (1) regional convention or one (1) regional convention or one (1) regional workday or cluster or one (1) teen conference on a rolling four (4) year period for the duration of her membership tenure. Financial is defined as having paid all chapter, regional and national dues, assessment and fees. A member who is not financial at any time during a program year shall not be entitled to vote until she resumes the status of being financial.
- C. Chapter members who relocate outside of the Nassau County Chapter may maintain membership in said organization if said member has been an active member in good standing in the chapter for a period of three years or more and she's able to maintain her obligations of membership as established by the original chapter.
- D. In the event that this chapter's boundaries change and excludes the residence of a mother in good standing, she may, within a period of one (1) year of the change, transfer to an existing chapter whose boundary encompasses her place of residence or the national office in the absence of a chapter in her place of residence, irrespective of the chapter membership quotas.







- E. The status of a member in good standing terminates at the end of the membership program year which includes all conventions when the youngest child completes high school or reaches age twenty (20), whichever comes first.
- F. Upon the death of a member in good standing, the children of said member may continue their affiliation with the organization for the duration of the fiscal period and the ensuing fiscal periods, if the parent (guardian) so desires. Said deceased member shall be classified as having completed their tenure in good standing thereby granting immediate legacy to her children irrespective of their age or if they continue to participate in the organization.

Section 2. Number of Members

When the chapter's membership exceeds 85 members, the chapter shall enter into a written agreement to share boundaries with one or more bordering chapter(s). The membership of each chapter entering into the agreement to share boundaries must ratify this agreement by majority vote of its members at a regular meeting of the members. Another chapter shall be allowed to organize in accordance with Article II, Section 6 of the National Constitution and Bylaws. When a chapter's membership reaches 100 members, the chapter will limit the new member intake to legacy and transfer applicants only in compliance with Article 1, Sections 2 and 3 of the Jack and Jill of America, Inc. National Bylaws.

Section 3. Age Eligibility

- A. Children of members automatically become participants at the age of two years. Said participation terminates when the youngster graduates high school or reaches the age of nineteen (19), whichever comes first.
- B. Any child who resides with and is receiving long term continuous care from a mother, female guardian or female custodial caretaker who is a member of Jack and Jill can participate in the chapter where the mother, female guardian or female custodial guardian is a member.

Section 4. Groups: Pre-K Grade Group, K-2 Grade Group, 3-5 Grade Group, Middle School Grade Group, and Teen Group

- A. Children of members automatically become participants at the age of two years. Said participation terminates when the youngster graduates high school or reaches the age of nineteen (19), whichever comes first.
- B. The group of the child is determined by the Agrade of the child on September 30th of the current year. These groups shall be adhered to unless the member for specified reasons, desires a child to be transferred to a different group. This request must be submitted to the President by the May Executive Board meeting in order to be read and voted on at said meeting. Said child must reach minimum age of the requested age group by December 31st of the current year.
- C. In any given program year where the number of children in an age group falls below five (5), the Executive Board may restructure the age groups for that program year to accommodate the smaller age group(s).







Section 5. Sponsoring Members and Applications

A. Names of members eligible to sponsor new members shall be determined by the order of their admission into the chapter and shall be listed on a sponsorship list maintained by the Chair of the membership Committee. These members will be responsible for filing application for new members. Subsequent members shall be eligible to sponsor new members in the order of their admission into the chapter. New members' names shall be added to the end of the sponsorship list in alphabetical order by year of entrance. Members must be in the chapter for 3 years before becoming eligible for sponsorship. Members who sponsored a candidate in any given year shall not be eligible to sponsor a candidate in the following year that there is a membership intake unless the membership votes by majority to have an open membership intake process in that year.

- B. In the event there is a need to enlarge an existing group or groups after the foregoing procedures have been followed, names will be presented by the next members on the sponsorship list according to the number of vacancies. If they are unable to satisfy the need, sponsorship shall be open to the general membership and the organization shall assume that sponsorship. The names of those members who do not sponsor at this time will remain in the same place on the eligibility list the following year.
- C. Members eligible to sponsor for the following program year shall be notified by the Vice President in May. The sponsor must confirm her intention to use her sponsorship option by notifying the Vice President by September 15. If this option to sponsor is not confirmed, the option shall pass on to the next eligible member. The names of those eligible members who decide not to sponsor will be placed at the top of the list for the following year.
- D. Sponsoring members shall be responsible for notifying the Vice President in writing as to the names and addresses of the new members to be sponsored and their child/children. The application of the family to be sponsored will be presented to the general body. Voting will take place at a Mothers' Meeting or Special Meeting held during the months of February through April.
- E. Chapters may only vote on new members once a program year. Acceptance is determined by 2/3 majority vote. If the application is accepted, the Corresponding Secretary shall send a formal invitation to the new member to attend a new member orientation in April.
- F. Prior to installation, the Executive Board shall assume responsibility for acquainting new members with chapter responsibilities. Installation of new members shall take place in May. New members must be present at the orientation and the installation. They will only be excused for extenuating circumstances and be installed at the next meeting, as determined by all members of the Executive Board through a majority vote.
- G. All new members' fees including joining and membership dues must be paid via guaranteed funds Money Order or Certified Check.







- H. Prospective new members with only teenaged children who are in the 11th grade or higher may not be sponsored into the organization.
- I. (1) Names of members who return from a leave of absence shall be moved down on the sponsorship list so that they are listed after the members of the next intake class that followed their admission to the chapter. If the member is returning from her second leave of absence, her name shall be moved down the list behind the members of the second intake class that followed her admission to the chapter.
- (2) A member returning from leave shall not be eligible to sponsor a new member for membership intake in the same program year in which she has returned.
- J. A mother must be Financial, as defined in Section 9 Finances, at all times during the sponsorship process. Failure to be financial shall deem such mother ineligible to sponsor, except for where extenuating circumstances exist and by approval of the Executive Board. Financial status shall be verified by the Financial Secretary at the time of the initial application of the prospective new member, throughout the sponsorship period up to and including the time of voting on prospective new members.

Section 6. Transfers

- A. Transfers in from other chapters shall be accepted on a letter of introduction from the National body. Their name shall then be placed at the bottom of the **members in good standing** list in the order of their admission into the Chapter.
- B. A member who changes her place of residence within a region and has been a member in good standing in a chapter for a period of three years or more is not required to transfer to an existing chapter in the new city, if she's able to maintain the obligations of membership as established by the original chapter. See National Bylaws Article II Section 8 for further clarification.

Section 7. Leave of Absence

- A. Members must notify the Executive Board, in writing, that they wish to become inactive and apply for a leave of absence by June 1st. They may be granted this privilege upon the approval of the chapter The Member must notify the Chapter Vice President by April 1st regarding their desire to return to active status.
- B. Leave of absence members shall not be responsible for chapter dues or fundraiser but shall be responsible for National and Regional per capita assessment. Members on leave of absence must meet all national and regional financial obligations, including the conference attendance requirement.

Section 8. Duties of Members

A. All members are expected to function on committees to which they select or are appointed to, in order that the activities of the chapter may be carried out effectively. Each member must serve on a minimum of two committees.







B. If an individual member is ill or for some reason unable to perform the duties assigned, it is her responsibility to so notify the President or Chairperson of her committee of her inability to perform such duties in ample time prior to such performance, in order that adequate arrangements can be made to replace her. The President or Chairperson will make an exchange appointment and so notify the members involved.

C. It is expected that members will involve their children in all chapter activities. Each member shall be responsible for the conduct of her child/children at all children's activities.

D. Members are responsible for notifying the Corresponding Secretary of a change in address, telephone number, and/or email. An active e-mail address is required. All members must have access to electronic communication and all notices and chapter communication may be sent to members via electronic communication.

Section 9. Finances

A. Membership shall be responsible for all fundraising projects and financial assessments voted by the majority. Members are to be given prior notice of a meeting at which there will be a vote on a fundraiser or other financial assessment. In the event of a fundraising affair, all financial members must fulfill their financial obligations by the date of the fundraiser. Other financial assessments must be paid by the deadline established at the time of the vote. Any member not assuming such responsibility will not be considered financial until this obligation is fulfilled. It is the responsibility of the Financial Secretary to report to the Executive Board any such member at the first Executive Board meeting following the fundraiser or other deadline. Dues will not be accepted for the following year until all previous financial obligations have been met.

- B. The chapter will charge a fee equal to the current bank fee for all returned checks. Only cash, money order, or certified check will be accepted as replacement for the returned check. The second time a check is returned by the same member, an additional fee will be imposed, and must be paid. A member who fails to pay the required fees will not be considered financial. Additionally, future financial obligations of that member must be met by certified check, money order, or cash. If a check is returned in error by the bank, it is the responsibility of the member to get the statement clarifying the error.
- C. Any member in default of payment of dues will be denied membership privileges. Such member shall be notified, in writing, by the Financial Secretary, of her impending termination. This notification shall be signed by both the Financial Secretary and the President and sent by registered mail, no later than June 15th. If all financial obligations have not been cleared by June 30th, the member's name shall be dropped from the membership roster and membership terminated on that date.
- D. Should a member experience extenuating circumstances that prevent a member from participating in the fundraiser, notice must be given to the Executive Board prior to the fundraiser to determine a payment plan for the member. The member shall remain responsible for the full cost of her fundraiser obligation; which shall be paid in full by May 31st of the current year.







E. A member whose membership is terminated due to unresolved financial obligations cannot be responsored until all outstanding debts to the chapter are resolved.

F. Where ever monies are involved, a due date for receipt of monies must be set.

Section 10. Expulsion of Members

A. A member may be expelled from the organization for behavior not in keeping with the constitution, Bylaws, Code of Ethics, policies and philosophy of the organization. The charges shall be presented to the Executive Board.

B. No vote of expulsion (except for Article III. Section 8. D-G) may be taken unless at least fifteen days notice in writing of the charges preferred have been given to the member by registered mail. Members shall be notified of the time and place of the meeting at which the charges will be considered. Action shall be taken by the majority vote of the Executive Board members present. If the member in question should not appear or respond to notice of said hearing, the above procedure will be adhered to in her absence. Said letter must include the reasons for the termination and the member's right to appeal. Copies of the letter shall be sent to

the Regional Director, the National Officer of the Eastern Region and the National Recording Secretary. A member shall have thirty (30) days to appeal after receiving notification of termination, first to the Executive Board: second to the Regional Director.

Section 11. Former Members

A. Former members must be re-sponsored. The former member must adhere to the same rules and regulations as prospective new members.

B. A member whose youngest child has graduated or reached the age of 20 may become an Associate Member of Jack and Jill by paying national, regional per capita taxes and a specified associate member chapter fee. Associate members may not vote or hold office. A person already holding office at the time of such an occasion may finish her term of office.

The Associate Group (as a group, not necessarily individually) must give financial support to the Jack and Jill of America Foundation, Incorporated. They may support the Foundation by assisting and/or supporting the local chapter with its fundraiser, by having their own fundraiser, or by making a donation.

Section 12.

Fathers' Auxiliary

The Father's Auxiliary will serve as a support group for the Chapter. The spouse of a member in good standing within the Chapter is eligible to participate in the Father's Auxiliary.







ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS AND DUTIES

Section 1. Officers

- A. Members who are elected to office are expected to fulfill the duties of that office.
- 1. There shall be the following elected officers:

- b. Vice President
- c. Program Director
- d. Recording Secretary
- d. Corresponding Secretary
- e. Treasurer
- f. Financial Secretary
- g. Editor
- 2. The following officers shall be appointed by the President
- a. Parliamentarian
- b. Chaplain
- c. Historian
- d. Sergeant At Arms
- e. Foundation Chair
- f. Legislative Chair
- g. Protocol Chair
- h. Group Activity Chairpersons, including Teen Advisors

Section 2. Duties of Officers

- A. President
- 1. To stimulate and direct the activities of children and parents.
- 2. To preside at the regular Mothers' meetings and the meetings of the Executive Board
- 3. Appoint committees and serve as ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating and Audit.

Committee.







- 4. Enforce the Constitution and Bylaws.
- 5. To render an annual culminating report at the May Mothers' meeting.
- B. Vice President
- 1. Assume the powers and duties of the President in the latter's absence or inability to act.
- 2. Maintain membership roster.
- 3. Keep accurate record of membership status, year entered, sponsor, termination date and reason.
- 4. Prepare Teens and Mother Members' roster for National and Regional by November 1st of each year.
- 5. Works with the Chapter Program Director to prepare Chapter Program Handbook for submission to National and Regional by November 1st of each year.
- 6. Acts as Chair of the Membership Committee
- C. Recording Secretary
- 1. Keep minutes of all proceedings of the Mothers' and Executive Committee Meetings.
- 2. Be responsible for recording of attendance at the Executive Board and Mothers' Meeting in the minutes.
- 3. Perform all duties usual to this office.
- 4. Have a copy of the Constitution, Bylaws, Standing Rules of Order and agenda at all meetings.
- D. Corresponding Secretary
- 1. Have charge of all correspondence on behalf of the members and Executive Board.
- 2. Keep a current list of the names and addresses of all members and notify the members of all Mothers' meetings.
- 3. Send and manage evites for chapter events.
- 4. Prepare credentials of delegate and alternate to Conventions and Conferences.
- 5. Perform all duties usual to this office.

E. Treasurer

- 1. Have charge of collecting and dispensing all funds belonging to the chapter, and depositing within seven (7) days in a bank account approved by the Executive Board.
- 2. Submit at the annual September meeting a detailed account of receipts and disbursements for the chapter fiscal year.
- 3. Sign jointly with the President or Financial Secretary, all checks withdrawn from the chapter's bank account.
- 4. Newly elected Treasurers shall conduct all business after August 1st.







- 5. Previous bank accounts shall be reconciled (instead of closed) by September 1st.
- 6. A minimum of one-third (1/3) of the net proceeds raised in the name of Jack & Jill of America, Inc. shall be designated for Jack & Jill of America Foundation. The remaining portion may be kept for the support of local charities and chapter designated charities as approved by the Internal Revenue Service.
- 7. Acts as Chair of the Budget Committee.
- F. Editor
- 1. Be responsible for obtaining and distributing publicity for the chapter activities.
- 2. Be responsible for arranging for photographs of group activities and other chapter membership activities.
- 3. Prepare articles for all regional and national publications.
- 4. Acts as Chair of the Publicity Committee
- 5. Works with the Vice President and Program Director to prepare Chapter Program Handbook for submission to National and Regional by November 1st of each year.
- G. Program Director
- 1. Coordinates all group activities.
- 2. Acts as Chair of the Program Committee and coordinates chapter activities.
- 3. Reports to the Executive Board on group activity attendance.
- 4. There shall be at least two (2) family activities a year to be held in September and May, or as designated by the chapter.
- 5. Works with the Chapter Vice President to prepare Chapter Program Handbook for submission to National and Regional by November 1st of each year.
- H. Financial Secretary
- 1. Receive and transmit without delay, upon receipt all monies and funds to the Treasurer.
- 2. Keep all financial records and notify each member of her financial status.
- 3. The Financial Secretary will submit a monthly written report to the chapter at the Mothers' meeting.
- 4. Serves on the Budget Committee.
- I. Legislative Chairperson
- 1. Be responsible for receiving and relaying to chapter information from National and Regional regarding legislation pertinent to children including State and Federal legislation.







2. Acts as Chair of the Legislation Committee

- J. Parliamentarian
- 1. Act as custodian of the Constitution and Bylaws and the chapter's one copy of Roberts Rules of Order.
- 2. Perform all duties usual to this office.
- 3. Acts as Chair of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee

K. Chaplain

- 1. Be responsible for the spiritual welfare of the chapter membership.
- 2. Perform all duties usual to this office.

L. Historian

Collect reports of chapter and group activities to be preserved for the chapter and to be shared with other chapters of Jack and Jill of America, Inc.

M. Sergeant-at-Arms

- 1. Assist the President or presiding officer at the Mothers' meetings and meetings of the Executive Board in keeping order among the membership.
- 2. Be the keeper of the time to insure for the timely start and ending of meetings and reports.
- N. Foundation Chairperson
- 1. Acts as Chair of the Foundation Committee.
- 2. Acts as a liaison between the Regional Member at Large and the chapter to disseminate information about Foundation and keep the chapter informed of fundraising guidelines.
- O. Group Chairperson
- 1. Hold sufficient number of Mothers' meetings to plan group activities for the year.
- 2. Plan the September activity.
- 3. Assign a mother to be responsible for each activity. Remind mothers that a minimum of two weeks (14 days) notification is required for monthly activities.
- 4. Keep an attendance record and activity report of all activities and submit timely to the Program Director.







- 5. Ensure that the responsible mother notifies each mother at least two weeks (14 days) in advance.
- 6. Ensure that activities are planned to cover all National programming areas

Section 3. Outgoing Officers

All outgoing chapter officers must complete all reports due at the end of their tenure and turn over all files and records to the incoming officers by June 15th.

ARTICLE V. COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Board

A. The Executive Board shall consist of all officers of the chapter, Activity Group Chairpersons, and Chairpersons of Standing Committees. The outgoing president shall automatically become a member of the Executive Board for one year. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to propose programs for the membership. The minutes of the Executive Board shall be read at the Executive Board meeting. The Executive Board shall meet regularly prior to each Mothers' meeting. A quorum for the meeting of the Executive Board shall consist of five (5) members of the Executive Board.

B. The Executive Board shall notify new members of their duties and obligations.

Section 2. Standing Committees

A. Budget – The Chairperson of the Budget Committee will be the Treasurer and one representative from each age group.

Responsibilities – To make sure National, Regional and local financial obligations are included in the budget. A financial report should be submitted at the September Mothers' meeting. The budget shall be presented at the January meeting and approved by the majority vote of those present and voting at the March meeting.

- B. Constitution This committee is composed of a chairperson who is the Parliamentarian and one person from each age group. This committee shall abide by the laws as set forth by National.
- C. Nominating This committee shall be formed prior to the January meeting and one member from each age-group shall serve on the committee. The chairperson for the nominating committee shall be the member who receives the highest number of overall votes to the committee. The committee shall prepare a slate of officers for the presentation at the January meeting. Voting will take place at the April meeting (no later than April 30th). Installation of officers shall take place at the May meeting (no later than May 31st)
- D. Courtesy This committee is composed of a chairperson appointed by the President and one representative from each age group. Responsibilities Each representative shall notify chairperson of all illnesses, etc., including children of all age







groups. The chairperson will send courtesies whenever needed. Welcome new members. Provide refreshments at Mothers' Meetings.

E. Program – The program committee will consist of the Program Director who will serve as chairperson and one representative from each age group. Responsibilities – Responsible for developing chapter programs. Plan an activity for National Jack and Jill Day. Prepare lists of names of children entering groups.

F. Fundraising – The chairperson of this committee may volunteer: however, if there is no volunteer it shall be the duty of the President to appoint a chairperson. In the event that the President does not appoint a chairperson, then the chapter will elect a chairperson. A person from each age group will work on this committee.

Section 3. New Committees

The President and/or the Executive Board may create additional Committees as needed from year to year.

ARTICLE VI. DUES AND ASSESSMENTS

Section 1. The Chapter Dues

A. The chapter dues shall be fixed yearly based on the recommendation of the Budget Committee, and shall be passed with a majority vote of the membership present and voting. Dues shall be payable by any of the chapters acceptable forms of payment. Acceptable forms of payment shall be indicated by the President or Financial Secretary.

Membership dues will be fully payable on June 1st of each year. To the extent payment is not received by June 1st or postmarked by June 1st, a \$50 late fee will accrue in addition to membership dues owed. If payment is not received by June 15th certified letters shall be sent indicating that membership will be terminated if payment is not received by June 30th.

B. A Member may request an extension to pay dues due to extenuating circumstances. Such extension must be approved by the President, Treasurer, and Financial Secretary; however, no request can extend beyond September 15th of the current fiscal year and the request must be made by June 30th of the current fiscal year. A fiscal year shall be defined as June 1 to May 31. Any requests for payments to be made beyond September 15th must be approved by the Executive Board. Extenuating circumstances are defined as one or more of the following:

- Job loss
- Illness
- Death of a family member
- Other circumstances to be decided at the discretion of the president, Treasurer and Financial

Secretary in the case of a request to extend payment up to September 15th, and decided by







the Executive Board for any requests to extend payment beyond September 15th.

C. Failure to pay dues by June 30th will result in termination procedures, as delineated in Article III. Section 8.G.

ARTICLE VII. MEETINGS

Section 1. Children's Meetings

There shall be at least five (5) children's activities a year. Guests at children's meetings shall be left to the discretion of the chairperson and the members involved; out-of-town Jack and Jill members are automatically invited to the children's regular meetings.

Section 2. Mothers' Meeting

A. **Monthly** Mothers' Meetings, which may include webinars, shall be held at least six times per year on the third Friday of the month **except in July and August.** The date of the regular meetings can be changed as needed by a majority vote of the members. Special meetings may be called at the order of the President and shall be counted as regular meetings

B. Members must attend 2/3 of scheduled Mothers' meetings. Prior to any scheduled meeting, a member shall notify the President or Recording Secretary if an absence is anticipated. Such absence shall be deemed excused. A warning letter will be sent following the first unexcused absence. If a member has three or more unexcused absences and/or fails to meet the minimum attendance requirement, except for extenuating circumstances which will be determined by the Executive Board, she and her child or children shall be automatically dropped, and will be so notified by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, signed by the President and Recording Secretary.

C. Notices of Mothers' Meetings shall be delivered to each member by e-mail at her last known e-mail address at least ten (10) days before the date of the meeting.

ARTICLE VIII. ELECTIONS and VOTING

Section 1. Officers

A. The elected officers shall be elected annually at the April meeting and no later than April 30th, by the majority vote of the members present and voting at the Mothers meeting. Voting shall be by secret ballot. Newly elected officers shall assume responsibility of office upon installation, except where described otherwise in these Bylaws. Installation of officers shall be held no later than May 31st of each election year.

B. Officers shall serve for a term of two (2) years or until their successors are elected with the President, Program Director, Recording Secretary and Financial Secretary, elected in even years; the Vice President, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, and Editor elected in odd years.







C. No officer shall serve more than two (2) consecutive terms, however there is no limit to the number of overall times a member may serve in an office.

D. In the event of a vacancy occurring in any of the foregoing offices, the President will fill such vacancy by appointment within thirty (30) days.

ARTICLE IX. CONVENTION DELEGATES

Section 1. Delegates

A. The President shall be designated as the Delegate and the Vice President shall be designated as the Alternate to attend the National Convention and the Regional Conference.

B. The chapter must be represented at the Mother's Regional Conference and Teen Conference or pay to the Regional Treasurer the cost of the registration fee for a delegate to help defray expenses of the region.

Section 2. National Convention and Regional Conference

Room, transportation and registration fees will be paid by the Chapter for one delegate and one alternate. The Chapter shall be responsible for providing two single rooms – one each for the delegate and the alternate.

Section 3. Teen Conference

A. Hotel and registration fees will be paid by the Chapter for a teen delegate, a teen alternate, and required chaperones. The chaperones shall consist of Teen Advisors and, if needed, **other members who are mothers of teens**, designated by the President in consultation with the Lead Teen Advisor.

B. To minimize the expense to Chapter, hotel rooms will be shared by the children. Similarly, chaperones will share hotel rooms on a double occupancy basis.

Section 4. Cluster Meeting

Registration fees will be paid by the Chapter for the Chapter President and the Teen President.

ARTICLE X. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES

All questions of parliamentary procedure shall be decided according to ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER NEWLY REVISED







ARTICLE XI. AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended yearly by submitting in writing the proposed amendment. Said amendment must be approved by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting at the second reading of the proposed bylaw change which occurs during the second of two (2) successive Mothers' Meetings; regular or special sessions called for that purpose.

ARTICLE XII. QUORUM

The quorum for a Mothers' Meeting shall consist of one third of the chapter membership. A quorum for a meeting of the Executive Board shall consist of five members of the Executive Board.

ARTICLE XIII. GENERAL

- A. These bylaws shall not conflict with nor be more restrictive than the National Constitution and Bylaws.
- B. All Chapters must submit a copy of their most current bylaws to Regional Director, subject to review by National President.
- C. All members and teens must sign the Code of Ethics Acknowledgement Form each program year by September 30th.







NASSAU COUNTY CHAPTER OF

JACK AND JILL OF AMERICA, INCORPORATED

TEEN BYLAWS

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Nassau County Teen Chapter of Jack and Jill of America, Inc.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

PURPOSE

The purpose of this organization is to bring together the teens of the Nassau County Chapter Of Jack and Jill of America, Inc., in order to provide a constructive exchange on educational, cultural, civic, recreational, and social pursuits and to promote the projects of the national and regional organization as they pertain to the teen group.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Any teen age 13-19, whose mother holds active membership in the Nassau County Chapter of Jack and Jill of America. Each teen's mother must also be in good standing and an active participant in the teen group. Teen activities are governed by these bylaws.

- Section 1. Active teens shall attend a minimum of 10 meetings teen group activities or chapter-wide activities. Teens are expected to participate in and support the Nassau County teens' service project(s). Teens shall have a minimum of one teen service project per program year.
- Section 2. Teens' mothers shall be financial in accordance with Article VI-Finance.
- Section 3. The Nassau County Teens shall be teens from grades 9-12 and ages 14-19. No teen shall remain in the Nassau County Chapter of Jack and Jill following graduation from high school.
- Section 4. The active status of a teen must terminate when he/she graduates from high school, or reaches age twenty (20), whichever comes first.
- Section 5. The active status of a teen must terminate when the mother/legal guardian/custodial caretaker withdraws her membership or is terminated from membership with her local chapter.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS







- Section 1. The Elected teen officers shall be the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Historian/Editor, Teen Foundation Chair, Parliamentarian, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Chaplain.
- Section 2. The term of office shall be one year. Officers shall serve no more than two consecutive terms in the same office.
- Section 3. Candidates for office must meet the following eligibility requirements.
 - a. All candidates' mothers shall be active and financial members of the chapter.
 - b. All candidates shall meet the attendance requirements in accordance with Article III Section 1.
 - c. Candidates for President and Vice President must have attended one (1) cluster or (1) teen conference.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

A. President

- a. Shall preside at all meeting.
- b. Shall assure that an agenda is available at all meetings.
- c. Shall follow the Bylaws of the Nassau County Teens' organization.
- d. Shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees.
- e. Shall represent the Chapter at Cluster meetings and Teen Conferences.

B. Vice-President

- a. Shall act as, President in the absence of the President at meetings, clusters, conferences and other regional meetings.
- b. Shall create a one-page fact sheet and discuss the service project at each meeting until completion.
- c. Shall be chair of the Social Committee.

C. Secretary

- a. Shall conduct the roll call at all meetings.
- b. Shall record the minutes of all chapter and teen executive board meetings.
- c. Shall maintain accurate and complete files of all written reports and correspondence submitted by officers and committees.
- d. Shall act as the President in the absence of both President and Vice-president







- e. Shall read all correspondence at a business meeting
- f. Shall issue all meeting notices and be responsible for all communications necessary for informing the membership.

D. Treasurer

- a. Shall collect dues no later than the October meeting.
- b. Shall maintain financial ledger of all monies collected.
- c. Shall issue receipts and provide a report for all monies collected to Executive Board, Teen Advisor and Chapter Financial Secretary.
- d. Shall give all monies to the Chapter Financial Secretary along with the report.
- e. Shall chair the Budget Committee and prepare budget for presentation at the for the upcoming program year.

E. Editor/Historian

- a. Shall write articles for publication in chapter, regional and national publications such as Upthe-Hill, Teen Regional Newsletter, Nassau County Mothers' Monthly Newsletter and local newspaper.
- b. Shall take photographs at Teen events.
- c. Shall work closely with the committee that will maintain the teen scrapbook for the year.

F. Chaplain

- a. Assists in the opening and/or closing of the teen meetings or as appropriate.
- G. Sergeant-at-Arms
 - a. Shall assist the President in maintaining order during business meetings.
 - b. Shall collect fines as set by the membership.

I. Parliamentarian

- a. Shall assist the President in maintaining parliamentary procedures during the business meetings.
- b. Shall acquaint members with parliamentary procedures and the chapter bylaws.
- c. Shall chair the Bylaws Committee.
- J. Teen Foundation Chair







a. Shall assist the Mothers' Foundation Chair and keep the teens informed of all fundraising guidelines.

ARTICLE VI

FINANCES

Section 1. Teens' mothers shall pay teen chapter membership dues no later than the October meeting. The amount of chapter membership dues will be voted on and approved, by the teens at the June meeting for the following program year. Teen chapter membership dues do not include National or Regional teen assessments which shall be paid annually by the mothers of teen members.

Section 2. Chapter and Regional dues as well as all assessments must be paid in order to be financial and in good standing. All teens' mothers must be financial to register for teen conference and for teens to be eligible for office.

Section 3. A teen's mother who fails to pay dues will prohibit her teen from participating in chapter teen activities.

ELECTIONS

Section 1. Officers shall be voted on at the April meeting and installed on or before May 31.

Section 2. Each candidate's mother must be active, financial, and in good standing.

Section 3. Each member who is present shall cast (1) vote by secret ballot.

Section 4. Officers shall be elected by a majority of the members present and voting. Majority means more than half present and voting. Graduating teens shall be eligible to vote.

ARTICLE VII - EVENTS

Section 1.Smoking, alcohol, drugs, cigarettes of any kind or weapons at Jack and Jill events is strictly prohibited.

ARTICLE VIII - STANDING COMMITTEES

Section 1. The standing committees are as follows:

Community Service Project Committee

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Fundraising Committee

Nominating Committee

Bylaws Committee

Budget Committee

Teen Conference Planning Committee

Section 2. Duties of the Standing Committee

- a. Community Service Committee shall plan and coordinate the service project. The Vice-President will chair this committee.
- b. Fundraising committee shall plan and coordinate fundraising project(s) in advance of the fundraiser. The treasurer will work closely with this committee.
- c. Nominating Committee shall oversee the selection of candidates for office. The chair of this committee shall be appointed by the teen president.
- d. Bylaws Committee shall publish and maintain chapter bylaws and prepare amendments for ratification as needed. The Parliamentarian will chair the ByLaws Committee.
- e. Budget Committee shall prepare and submit to membership a proposed budget, at the commencement of each program year for the utilization of teen chapter membership dues.
- f. Teen Conference Planning Committee shall coordinate contest submissions for teen conference. Contest submissions shall include, but are not limited to, Chapter Banner, T-Shirt, Scrapbook and Visual Art Display entries.

ARTICLE IX - MEETINGS

Section 1. General Meetings

- a. There shall be a minimum of 7 general meetings per year with the last meeting in June serving as the meeting and graduation party for the end of the year where graduating teens will be honored and new teens will be welcomed. The June meeting will also serve as the activity and meeting planning session for the following program year.
- b. Monthly meetings are to take place on the first Sunday of each month.
- c. A special meeting of the general body may be called at the order of the President or the Executive Board. Members must be informed in writing of the agenda for all special meetings.
- d. A quorum shall consist of one-third (1/3) of the entire membership. A majority vote of the members present at the time shall be necessary except where otherwise stated in these bylaws.







Section 2. Executive Board

- a. The Executive Board shall consist of the elected and officers and chairpersons of standing committees.
- b. All meetings of the Executive Board shall be open to the general membership.

Section 3. Duties of the Executive Board

- a. Plan general meeting agenda.
- b. Receive all committee plans and suggestions and make specific recommendations to membership.
- c. Receive and review written officers/committee reports prior to general meetings.

ARTICLE X - CONVENTION DELEGATES

Section 1. Teen Conference

Hotel and registration fees will be paid by the Chapter for a teen delegate, a teen alternate, the Chapter President and required chaperones. The chapterones shall consist of Senior Teen Advisors, the Chapter President and other elected senior teen mothers as required for the number of teens attending.

To minimize the expense to the Chapter, hotel rooms will be shared by the children. Similarly, chaperones and the Chapter President will share hotel rooms on a double occupancy basis or personally pay the single room surcharge.

Section 2. Cluster Meetings

Registration fees will be paid by the chapter for the Presidents of the Mothers and Senior Teen Group.

ARTICLE XI - AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended by submitting in writing the proposed amendment. Said amendment must be approved by two-thirds vote of those present and voting at the second reading of the proposed bylaw change. Said reading shall occur at the second successive Teen Meeting.







NASSAU COUNTY POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

ELIGIBILITY

1. A mother, female legal guardian, or female custodial caretaker of children between the ages of two (2-19) years and through their nineteenth (19) years may hold active membership in Jack and Jill of America, Inc. A female legal guardian or custodial caretaker shall be required to produce legal documentation of her legal or custodial status.

A mother in "good standing" is defined as a mother who is both Active and Financial in the Organization.

- a. Active A mother is active if she meets all of the participation requirements of the organization.
- b. Financial A Mother is financial when she is current on all Chapter, Regional, and National dues, assessments and/or fees
- 2. A Mother who is NOT in good standing, places her membership in jeopardy.
 - a. The Mother shall be notified by the Chapter Vice-President, via certified mail, of her membership status, the corrective actions needed, and the deadline by which corrective actions must be completed.
- b. If the Mother does not correct the deficiencies as delineated in the written notification, her membership shall be subject to immediate termination.
 - c. Termination decisions will follow those outlined in the Chapter Bylaws.

ONE IN FOUR ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Members must register and attend a regional mother's conference, a teen conference, a regional area workday/mothers cluster or a national convention every four years.
- 2. A mother's compliance with this policy shall be determined as of June 30th of each calendar year after all financial deadlines have passed for the prior fiscal year and all regional and/or national conferences/conventions have been held for that year, and prior to submission of membership documentation and per capita taxes to the regional and national organization for the new program year.
- 3. The Chair of Membership shall generate a report out of the MIS system of all members in the chapter who have not attended one of the above-mentioned activities within the past 3 years. The vice president/membership chair of the chapter or her designee shall send a letter to the member notifying the member that the records reveal they are not in compliance and must attend one of the above mentioned activities in order to graduate in good standing.
- 4. A mother must actually register and ATTEND the event. At the time of attendance, the member must be a member and resident of the region in order for the attendance to count toward compliance with the one-in-four requirement. Attendance at a children's cluster does not count.
- 5. If a mother is determined to have not complied with this policy on June 30th, of their fourth year, the penalty imposed upon the mother shall be termination which shall be effective for the new program year. If a mother member graduates out of the organization and she has not met the one-in four requirement she has not graduated in "good standing".

GRADE GROUPS







- 1. Grade groups are determined by the grade of the child on September 30th of the current year. Groups shall be divided by the following grades:
- Pre-K
- K-2
- 3-5
- Middle School Tweens
- Teen
- 2. A member who desires for their child to be transferred to a different grade group, must send a letter to the President stating specific reasons for the request. The letter shall be received by the May Executive Board meeting in order for it to be read and voted on at said meeting. The Executive Board may consider multiple factors including the gender ratio of each group.
- 3. For each grade group in which a mother has a child, the mother is responsible for sponsoring a grade appropriate activity for at least one month during the calendar year from September through June, which falls under at least one of the 9 programmatic thrusts.
- 4. Grade group activities are conducted on the following days for the respective age groups:
 - a. The Pre-K grade group activity will be held on the first Saturday of every
 - b. The K-2 grade group activity will be held on the second Saturday of every month.
 - c. The 3-5 grade group activity will be held on the third Saturday of every month.
 - d. The MS Tweens grade group activity will be held on the fourth Saturday of every month.
 - e. The Teen group activity will be held on the first Sunday of the month.
- 5. Any change from the above described activity schedule may occur only if agreed to by vote of the mothers in the relevant age group.
 - a. The vote to change the age group activity day is conducted by the age group chair(s).
 - b. The request for the vote shall include the reason for the proposed change and a deadline by which mothers must vote.
 - i. A vote to change the day of the activity shall not be deemed a commitment to attend the activity on the new day and does not constitute a vote on the new date.
 - c. For the change to be in effect, 100% of mothers who vote must vote yes.
- d. If a mother abstains from voting or fails to submit her vote by the deadline, her failure to vote will be considered a vote in favor of the date change.

SPONSORING MEMBERS

- 1. Names of members eligible to sponsor new members shall be maintained on a sponsorship list by the Chair of Membership and updated annually.
- 2. A member is eligible to sponsor a new member after she has completed 3 full years of service in the chapter. Sponsorship of a PNM shall occur during her 4th year of membership.
- 3. The sponsorship list, for mothers eligible to sponsor, shall be circulated to the members by the June meeting.







4. The sponsoree list will primarily be comprised of mothers of interest that have demonstrated a heightened interest in Jack and Jill and participated in the New Member Intake process outlined by the Membership committee with a comprehensive review of FIT+L.

PROSPECTIVE NEW MEMBERS

- 1. A prospective new member (PNM) is a mother who has expressed an interest in learning about Jack and Jill of America, Inc. and has attended an informational session or a Meet & Greet with a member of the Membership committee.
- 2. For a chapter member to refer a PNM for inclusion on the PNM Contact List, the referring member must have been in the Nassau County chapter for a minimum of two years. Members of other chapters and associate members of the Nassau County chapter may also refer a PNM, but may not become a sponsor for them.
- 3. The Chair of Membership shall maintain a PNM Contact List. After attending a Meet & Greet or Informational session, the PNM will be added to the PNM Contact List and become eligible to attend 'OPEN' age group and chapter activities. It will be the responsibility of the Activity Host, coupled with the Referring Mom, to ensure that the PNM's get invited to 'OPEN' events, once eligible.
- 4. PNM's will be held to the same RSVP and financial commitments as the chapter members with respect to attendance at Open age group and chapter events.
- 5. The referring member is expected to educate the PNM about financial responsibilities. An PNM who fails to honor her financial responsibilities will be removed from the PNM Contact List and the referring chapter member shall be responsible for the financial obligations of the PNM. If the referring member is not a Nassau County chapter member then the chapter will bear the removed PNM's financial obligation.
- 6. PNM's will have one year from the date of their Informational/Meet & Greet to secure a sponsor. At end of one year, if sponsorship is not secured, they will be notified and removed from the PNM Contact list.
- 7. PNM's who attend an informational session or a Meet & Greet with a member of the Membership committee and express an interest in continuing the process shall be strongly encouraged to participate in a service activity prior to the intake vote. The service activity shall be Teen Summit, the Breast Cancer Walk, or another appropriate activity, as agreed to by the Membership committee, in consultation with the Service Committee and Executive Board.

EXPULSION OF MEMBERS

 A member may be expelled from the organization for unfavorable behavior that is referenced in the Chapter Bylaws, National Bylaws or Code of Ethics. All charges against a member shall be documented and presented to the Executive Board (by certified mail) detailing the reason(s) for the requested expulsion. Reasons must be fact-based and not based on perception, gossip or other reasons that cannot be verified.







- 2. A member will have thirty (30) calendar days to appeal in writing, to the Executive Board. If the appeal is deemed unsatisfactory by the Executive Board, a member has thirty (30) calendar days to appeal in writing to the Regional Director upon written notification of appeal results from the Executive Board.
- 3. A member whose membership has been terminated that decides to reapply for a new membership in the organization must state on their application that their previous membership was terminated for cause.
- 4. A member who fails to state their termination on any new application for membership in the organization is subject to immediate termination due to fraud.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

- 1. A member may request a written leave of absence as specified in our Chapter's Bylaws.
- 2. Any member who has been granted a leave of absence by the chapter must meet all National and Regional financial obligations. A member must also be in good standing, as per the National Constitution and Bylaws, before requesting a leave of absence.
- 3. A leave of absence prohibits the participation of the entire family in closed chapter events.
- 4. While on a leave of absence, a member is ineligible to vote or sponsor new members. A member is unable to transfer or graduate out while on leave. A member cannot participate in Chapter, Regional, or National activities while on leave. A member can participate in public events and activities sponsored by Jack and Jill of America, Inc.

OFFICERS AND DUTIES

- 1. Members who are elected to office are expected to fulfill the duties of that office as stated in the chapter bylaws.
- 2. All outgoing officers must complete all reports due at the end of their tenure. In a transition meeting, they shall meet with the incoming officer to turn over all files and records by the 15th of June, to ensure the continuity of the office.
- 3. An officer is subject to discipline if she fails to perform the office duties or fails to have an orderly transition between outgoing and incoming officers, as per the National Constitution and Bylaws, or other governing documents.

CHAPTER DUES. ASSESSMENTS AND FEES

- 1. Chapter dues shall be fixed yearly based upon the recommendation from the Budget committee, and shall be passed with a majority vote of the membership present and voting.
- 2. Dues shall be paid in full by the June 1st deadline. Partial payments are not acceptable, nor will payment plans be accommodated. Dues must be received by the Financial Secretary or postmarked by the June 1st deadline to avoid a late fee. A late fee of \$50 will be assessed to any member whose dues are received after this date.







If full dues have not been received by June 15^{th,} a certified letter shall be sent to the member, at their last known address, indicating their membership will be terminated if payment is not received by June 30th.

3. In the event of extenuating circumstances, a member may request an extension to pay dues and the late fee may be waived. This request shall be provided in writing to the Chapter President and shall be approved by the Chapter President, Treasurer and

Financial Secretary. Per chapter bylaws, no extensions may be granted beyond October 15th of the current fiscal year. Any requests for dues to be received after the October 15th date shall require the approval of the Executive Board. Extenuating circumstances are defined as one or more of the following:

- Job Loss
- Illness
- Death of a family member
- Other circumstances to be decided at the discretion of the President, Treasurer and the Financial Secretary.
- 4. Members who have paid by check for chapter related expenses, resulting in two (2) returned checks fees within a program year shall pay their dues by guaranteed funds. This may be in the form of a money order, certified check or cash. Bank fees will also be paid by said member based upon the charges incurred by the chapter.
- 5. Chapter members may be reimbursed for any approved expenditures associated with chapter programs, meetings or events. All requests for reimbursement shall be given to the Treasurer prior to the close of the program year. Members will not be reimbursed for any expenses that are not submitted by this time.
 - All check requests must be accompanied by a voucher and a receipt.
 - The voucher must be completed in its entirety and include name, address, full description of items purchased, reason for purchase, and the signature of the requesting member
 - Vouchers may be obtained from the Jack and Jill website.
- 6. All members are responsible for ensuring there are no outstanding payments due to the chapter in order to be considered financial for the upcoming program year. The Financial Secretary will notify any member who has an outstanding debt. All financial obligations to the chapter (and/or its members) must be paid prior to the Treasurer accepting members' dues for the upcoming year; this includes payment of late fees, returned check fees, assessments and penalties.

ELECTION PROCEDURES

POLICY

- 1. Nominating Committee
 - a. A nominating committee must be established prior to the January Meeting by election to take place at or before the November Mother's Meeting
 - The chapter nominating committee is comprised of members representing each grade group and elected by majority vote of those present at the Mothers Meeting.
 - ii. The chairperson of the Nominating committee shall be the member who received the most number of votes. In the event of a tie, there shall be a second vote taken to elect a chair of the committee from only those members who received the tie vote. If a tie remains







after the second vote, the chairperson shall be selected by a random method, for instance, flipping a coin or picking a name out of a hat.

- (a). If the member of the Nominating committee that receives the most votes has less than two years tenure in the chapter, the member who has the next highest number of votes shall be the chairperson of the Nominating committee.
- b. The members of the Nominating Committee must be unbiased and

. The members of the Nominating Committee must be unbiased remain neutral while performing committee duties.

- i. Members of the Nominating Committee cannot endorse or campaign for a particular candidate during chapter meetings
- ii. A member who is found campaigning for a particular candidate during a chapter meeting or acting in a biased manner shall be removed from the Nominating Committee.
- iii. Members of the Nominating Committee may not run for elected office while serving on the Nominating Committee. If a member intends on running for an elected position, that member should not accept the nomination for Nominating Committee. If a member of the Nominating Committee is nominated for a position and accepts such nomination, she must resign from the Nominating Committee immediately.
- iv. Members of the Nominating Committee shall keep confidential all aspects of the election process, except those elements which are included in the Nominating Committee Report at the Executive Board Meetings and Mothers Meetings.

2. Tellers

- a. The Nominating Committee chairperson shall appoint Tellers from the committee to administer the balloting process, count votes, and certify election results.
- 3. Eligibility to Run For Office
 - a. Members shall be allowed to nominate only ONE person per elected office and Distinguished Mother.
- b. A member desiring to run for office must be a member in good standing at all levels of the Organization (chapter, regional and national) when the nomination is accepted.
 - i. A member in good standing is both "financial" and "active" as defined in our bylaws.
 - ii. Should an officer be found non-compliant with any of the Organization's governing documents, she will be deemed ineligible and immediately removed from the slate/office.
 - c. A member desiring to run for a chapter office must meet the requirements for that office.
 - d. Qualifications for Office
 - i. President
 - 1. Candidates *must* have a minimum of three (3) years tenure in the chapter.
 - 2. Candidates should have attended at least 1 National or Regional meeting/conference and 2 Clusters.
 - 3. Candidates must have previous service on the Executive Board
 - ii. Vice President
 - 1. Candidates **must** have a minimum of three (3) years tenure in the chapter.
 - 2. Candidates should have attended at least 1 Regional meeting/conference and 2 Clusters.
 - 3. Candidates must have previous service on the Executive Board
 - iii. Program Director







- 1. Candidates **must** have a minimum of two (2) years tenure in the chapter.
- 2. Candidates must have served on the Executive Board.
- 3. Candidates should have served as a Group Activity Chair or have previous service on the Program Committee.
- 4. Candidates should have attended at least one cluster or Regional meeting/conference.

iv. Treasurer

- 1. Candidates *must* have a minimum of two (2) years tenure in the chapter.
- 2. Candidates should have financial, accounting or bookkeeping experience acquired professionally or in the alternative, acquired in another organization.
 - 3. Candidates should have attended at least one cluster or regional meeting/conference.
- v. Recording Secretary
 - 1. Candidates *must* have a minimum of one (1) year tenure in the chapter.
 - 2. Candidates should be mindful that there is an expectation of nearly perfect attendance and punctuality at the Mother's

Meetings/Executive Board Meetings.

3. Candidates should have the ability to take accurate minutes.

vi. Corresponding Secretary

1.Candidates **must** have a minimum of one (1) year tenure in

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the chapter. vii. Financial Secretary

- 1. Candidates **must** have a minimum of two (2) years tenure in the chapter.
- 2. Candidates should have financial, accounting or bookkeeping experience acquired professionally or in the alternative, acquired in another organization.
- 3. Candidates should have attended at least one cluster or regional meeting/conference.

viii. Editor

- 1. Candidates **must** have a minimum tenure of a year tenure in the chapter.
- 2. Candidates should be organized and have the ability to meet deadlines.
- 3. Candidates should have excellent written communication skills **and have a working knowledge of management information systems.**
- e. A member who has served two consecutive terms in a specific elected office is ineligible to run for the same position.
 - i. The Nominating Committee will inform the members which, if any, members are ineligible to run for a specific position because they have served two consecutive terms in the same position.
 - f. The Nominating Committee will inform the members which, if any, members are graduating and, as such, ineligible for nomination to an elected position.

4. Campaigns

- a. The Nominating Committee determines and shall set forth in writing, the specific campaign procedures that must be followed by all candidates for office.
- b. Guidelines for Campaigning
 - i. Candidates are permitted to make a short (2 minute) oral presentation detailing their qualifications and/or interest in a position. Candidates may entertain questions following this short presentation.







- ii. Campaigning should take place in a manner designed to reach the entire membership and reduce intimidation and/or undue influence. Therefore, for example, a candidate may send a chapter-wide email message or mailing prior to the date of the election detailing the candidate's qualifications for the position the candidate is seeking.
- ii. In order to avoid intimidation, undue influence and to provide a level playing field for all candidates seeking open positions, telephone calls should not be made to individual members for the purpose of seeking votes.
- iii. Nominations may be made from the floor on the day of the Election.

5. Elections

- a. The Nominating Committee shall prepare the ballots of slated candidates for elections.
- b. The Presiding Officer shall conduct elections.
- c. The Tellers should administer the ballot process during elections, count properly cast ballots and certify election results.

PROCEDURE

- 1. Nominating Committee
 - a. The Nominating Committee shall announce the opening of the election process at the January Mother's Meeting and via email.
 - b. The announcement shall include:
 - i. Names of open positions
 - ii. Minimum requirements to be a candidate for open positions
 - iii. Deadlines for submitting nominations for open positions
 - iv. Deadlines for submitting acceptance of a nomination or declaration of a member's candidacy for a particular office
 - v. The date and location of the election
- c. The Nominating Committee shall publish a slate of names for each office at the March meeting and by email
 - d. The nominating committee shall publish specific campaign guidelines to be followed by candidates.
 - e. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a ballot of slated candidates during the election.

2. Eligibility for Office

- a. A candidate must remain a member in good standing throughout the election process and her tenure in office.
- b. A candidate must meet all minimum requirements for an office at the time she announces her candidacy.
 - i. If at any time during the campaign season, the candidate fails to meet the minimum requirements for the position, she will be disqualified and immediately removed from the slate of candidates for office.

3. Election Process

- a. No campaign material is allowed in or around the room designated for voting.
- b. The Presiding Officer is responsible for conducting the election.
- c. The Tellers assist with the distribution and tally of ballots.







- i. A single ballot shall be used with all approved candidates appearing on one ballot in the following order, as applicable:
 - 1. President
 - 2. Vice President
 - 3. Program Director
 - 4. Recording Secretary
 - 5. Corresponding Secretary
 - 6. Financial Secretary
 - 7. Treasurer
 - 8. Editor
- ii. The positions in bold type are elected in even years; the other positions not in bold type are elected in odd years.
- d. A winner will be decided by majority vote of the members present for the election greater than 50%.
- e. In the event of a tie or if the ballot does not yield a majority vote for a position, voting will continue until a winner is declared, as follows:
 - i. If the first ballot yields a tie or does not yield a winner with a majority vote, a second vote will be taken for that position
 - ii. If the second ballot yields a tie or does not yield a winner with a majority vote, the Nominating Committee shall present a question to the candidates and each candidate shall have one minute to respond. Thereafter, a third vote shall be taken.
 - ii. If after a third vote, there is still a tie, the candidates' names shall be placed in a container and the chair of the Nominating Committee shall draw one name from the container. The name drawn shall be declared the winner of the election for that office.

4. Tellers Duties

- a. Administer election process using secret ballots
- b. Count all properly cast ballots
- c. Report election results to the Presiding Officer
- d. Prepare written report of the election process, including results, for submission to the Recording Secretary.








November is election season and it provides a great opportunity for our Jacks and Jills to review the importance of voting and the history of voting rights in America as it pertains to African Americans. For this activity we will review highlights from the book The Fifteenth Amendment: African American Men's Right to Vote by Susan Banfield.

Legislative Advocacy: Grade Group: 6-8

Anti-Bullying Campaign

Our JJNC grade group 3-5 will collaborate to form an Anti-Bullying Campaign with hashtag (#wordshurt) and outreach to congressman in our town and city. Our children will learn about different forms of bullying, as well as practice the value of advocating against bullying and discrimination of all kinds including, and not limited to racism & Damp; skin color, hair differences, gender types & Damp; family constellations (LGBTQ), disabilities and learning differences, etc. We will challenge our children to become advocates in the world against discrimination and bullying, and we will prepare them to handle 'in the moment' incidences should they be exposed to such behaviors.

Voter Registration Drive & Board of Elections Tutorial

The Legislative Committee will proceed with a year-round individual voter registration effort. Ask each teen to register at least one person; provide them with the forms and a "how to" in order to execute at school or at church; each teen should ensure that completed forms are returned to them so that we can get a proper count of how many were completed and then submit them in batches to the Bd of Elections.

A representative from the Board of Elections will be asked to provide a tutorial to our youth in each age group on how to cast a vote and use the voting machine.







CIVIC/COMMUNITY SERVICE

MLK Day of Service: Grade Group: K-2, 3-5, 6-8, and 9-12

On January 21, 2020, the Jacks and Jills of Nassau County will be participating in a hands-on service project where they will be working with the residence of an assisted living facility. They will be addressing three important pillars: food, literacy and mental health. Our children will be reading, singing and interacting with the largely African American residents of an assisted living complex in Freeport, Long Island. Prior to this hands-on service they will be putting together gift packages which will consist of healthy snack choices. We've learned that these types of residents are often lonely, therefore the presence of children bring them joy.

SOCIAL/RECREATIONAL - ORATORICAL MASTERS

Gavel Club: Grade Groups 3-5, 6-8, and 9-12

Our Jacks and Jills meet the first Friday of each month and work on oral presentation, inclusive of eye contact, voice clarity, protection and posture. They are writing speeches this year on what it means to be black in America, as well as other topics centered around current events and black history. Additionally, Our Jacks and Jills will have the opportunity to practice the principles at the completion of every age group activity, telling the group what they liked about the activity.











CHAPTER FUNDRAISER – DENIM & DIAMONDS

She emphasized having a social activity that encourages team building and bonding to start the year off positive. No child should feel left out. She spoke of civic/service activities and suggested book, food and clothing collections that will service the community. She emphasized health activities that encourages mental health and a chapter wide swimming activity.

Next, our Group Chairs

convened the mothers assigned to their respective groups. Armed with the Master Chapter Calendar, personal calendars, school calendars, activity reports and group planning sheets, mothers discussed their ideas and plans for the group activity calendar, selected their preferred month to serve as activity host, chose target program thrusts to fulfill, and worked to ensure a balanced program year for our children. Group Chairs also ensured that mothers completed the medical liability forms. We look forward to our next Planning Meeting on Friday, June 5, 2020 at 7 p.m. at the Westbury Community Center in Westbury, NY.

SIGNATURE PROGRAMS & EVENTS

Jack and Jill Gavel Club - Nassau County

Once a month, our Jack and Jill Gavaliers meet to develop their confidence and competence in interpersonal skills, public speaking, and leadership. With a curriculum provided by Toastmasters International, our Jacks and Jills have many unique speaking roles: including, preparing speaking tips, giving reports, delivering speeches, critiquing speeches and many more. Importantly, our Gavaliers learn how to improve themselves with the help of their peers.

Oratorical Program (October)

Our local Oratorical Contest, under the purview of the Education and Scholarship Committees, is facilitated with the help of the Associate Mothers and volunteers of Young Professionals from the Urban League. The topic mirrors that of the Region and is Black by Popular Demand. The goal of the contest is designed to inspire and encourage our Jacks and Jills to embrace and value the art of public speaking. It will also encourage them to participate in the Regional Oratorical Contests at Cluster and Teen Conferences. We also recognize the Oratorical Contest winners within our chapter from each respective grade group at Black Family Day in May where they present their winning speeches!

Making Strides with Pride, Breast Cancer Walk (October)

Every year the entire chapter participates in the fight against breast cancer walk sponsored by the American Cancer Society. The Walk is meaningful to our chapter as one of our member moms, Stephanie Margetson, succumbed to the disease in 2014. This year our chapter continued to honor Stephanie's legacy and in unity walked once again.

Young Investors Symposium (November)

Our Jacks and Jills will participate in an engaging three-hour financial workshop geared toward improving our children's understanding of financial planning and finances generally. Our Jacks and Jills will learn about investing, the financial side of college planning, the impact of one's credit score and its effect on buying power, and overall relationship with money. MLK Day is a day service, sacrifice and sunshine. Each age group and the mothers will be bringing joy to the often forgotten residents of the assisted living community. After speaking to the manager, we have found that the residents, many time forgotten by their families, absolutely love when little children come to visit them. Our activities with them will be *simple* and *entertaining* for both the residents and the children.

Teen Summit (January)

On January 5, 2019, Jack and Jill Nassau County hosted its 11th Annual Teen Leadership Summit from 9:00am to 4:00 pm at the beautiful Adelphi University in Garden City, Long Island. Every year Jack and Jill Nassau County endeavors to provide a full day of personal and professional enrichment to the high school students in our community. Since its inception, the goal of the Teen Summit has been to reach teenagers in often underserved communities and empower them through workshops that cover a wide range of topics.

POWERFUL AND PURPOSEFUL PROGRAMMING

A Quick Guide to Planning Well Communicated, Creative and Community-fostering Grade Group Activities.

Plan early and include as many mothers as possible in the planning process.

Plan Quality Programs that are engaging, enriching, exciting, exposing, igniting, age appropriate and reflects chapter needs and wants. The programmatic thrust to be considered:

- ✓ Education
- ✓ Health
- ✓ Cultural
- ✓ Social
- ✓ Financial Literacy
- ✓ Civic/Community Service
- ✓ Recreational
- ✓ Legislative
- ✓ Leadership Development

*Programming ideas are in abundance and may be found by reviewing the Jack and Jill of America Membership Handbook, Jack and Jill of America publications, including, current and past issues of the SCOPE and previous editions of the Jack and Jill of Nassau County Handbook.

Quick Tips for Success

Meeting the thrust: Always ask, will my proposed activity accomplish the goals of the organization – locally and nationally?

Check the calendar: Grade Group Activities should not conflict with chapter-wide activities, including clusters. Therefore, be proactive, check the chapter-wide calendar for any potential conflicts and address it with the group early!

Plan stellar programs early: we want to ensure events are well attended, enjoyed by all, yet meaningful in its accomplishment of the programmatic thrust.

Consider the Grade Group: Plan activities that will meet the developmental needs of the children in the Grade Group.

Who can attend: Only members of our chapter may attend our closed activities. Hosts are to indicate if tag-alongs are welcome and tag-alongs must be members of the chapter to attend.

- o Mothers of Interest join us in November
- o Sponsorees join us in February.







o Any new members are welcome to join us for our pre-planned June activities

Weather dependent activities: If an activity is dependent on the weather, plan and indicate a "rain date".

Food at the activity: Hosts must inform the attendees if food will or will not be present. Younger groups should always have a meal planned within their activity.

Changing the date: Grade Groups are scheduled to meet at the same time monthly. Changes to your Grade Group designated date must be approved by 100% of the mothers in the Grade Group, otherwise, it must proceed on the designated date.

- o Pre-Kindergarten Group meets the First Saturday of the month
- o Kindergarten Grade 2 Group meets the Second Saturday of the month
- o Grades 3 5 Group meets the Third Saturday of the month
- o Grades 6 8 Group meets the Fourth Saturday of the month
- o Grades 9 12 Group meets the First Sunday of the month







MOTHER MENTOR/MENTEE PROGRAM



The first three years of membership are critical to the long-term retention of a member and the cost efficiencies. In an effort to acclimate and provide a great level of support to our new mothers and/or transferring Chapter members, this program is designed to help them understand the expectations of membership and to serve as a ready resource.

The Nassau County Chapter require our Mother Mentors to:

- 1. Be active and engaged
- 2. Be in the organization for at least five years
- 3. Attend Chapter meetings on a regular basis
- 4. Participate in Chapter-wide Activities
- 5. Ensure their children attend Grade Group Activities
- 6. Attend a Mothers Cluster Workday, or Regional Conference or National Convention no less than every four years
- 7. Have children within the same Grade group
- 8. Be enthusiastic and interested in mentoring

In addition to the characteristics sought of the Mother, the Mentor/Mentee Program requires attention to the pairing to ensure the right fit. Opportunities were provided to mothers who were new to mentoring. All mentors participated in the Mentor's Training Workshop held in September 2017. The workshop outlined the basic guidelines of serving as a mentor to ensure that all new mothers and transfers have a consistent first year experience and receive the same level of interaction.

The Mentor/Mentee Program Kickoff occurs in November 2019. There will be subsequent gatherings and membership check-ins throughout the program year between the mentor/ mentee and the Mentoring Committee.

Mentoring a mother is a big responsibility. All of the steps have been taken to ensure that each mother new to our chapter is on the path to becoming a great member. We are grateful for the addition of Moms to our chapter for the 2019-2020 Program Year and thank the 2019-2020 Mentoring Team!!

RESPONSIBILITIES OF ACTIVITY HOST(S)

- Research venue and make all necessary arrangements/reservations.
- Coordinate all particulars re: activity (Location, Time, Cost, etc.)
- Prepare detailed Evites and send out to group at least 4 weeks prior to activity. If not possible, then submit a "Save the Date".
- Make it simple for mothers by using the standard invitation forms used by the chapter; Evite is currently the standard form.
- Track responses on Evite/Email and follow-up with Moms (Call and Text moms if necessary, sometimes this is more effective in reaching out).
- Ensure pictures are taken during the activity and/or designate someone to take pictures if Grade Group Co-Chairs are not at the activity. Forward pictures to Grade Group Chairs and Grade Group Co-Chairs. Grade-Group Co-Chairs are responsible for uploading photos to the Jack and Jill Flickr account.
- After your activity, prepare your activity report and email to Chair, Co-Chair and Program Director. The Activity Report must include:
 - O List of kids and moms in attendance,
 - O Detailed description of activity, what the activity entailed, what the Jack & Jills were expected to learn from the activity and how the activity relates to any of the focus areas of programming.
 - o Cost of activity (if applicable) and overall rating of activity
 - o If co-hosting make certain you discuss and make clear with your co-hosts who is responsible for each of the above.
 - O It is also good idea to obtain feedback from the children about the activity.
- If you are unable to fulfill your obligation as Activity Lead for any reason, contact your Grade Group Chair as soon as you know.
- If you want to swap a month with another mother, coordinate with that mother directly. Once you both agree, notify your Grade Group Chair of the change.

If you need to make a date change to your month's activity, you need 100% approval from the entire mother's in the group, regardless if she will or will not be attending the activity.

GAVEL CLUB PUBLIC SPEAKING CORE PRINCIPLES

The following core principles are foundational for our Jacks & Jills from PreK to Teens in their development as confident, effective and eventually prolific public speakers.

5 REMINDERS TO SHARE WITH JINC YOUTH AT EACH AGE GROUP ACTIVITY:

- 1. **STAND TALL** Shoulders & back straight like the King or Queen you are on your throne!
- 2. **PROJECT YOUR VOICE** Speak so the back of the room can hear you!
- 3. EYE CONTACT Look around the entire space so everyone knows you are talking to them!
- **4. ENUNCIATE YOUR WORDS** Say each word clearly!
- 5. EMPHASIZE YOUR WORDS Say your words with feeling!

GUIDING NOTE on exemplifying public speaking skills at Age Group Activities:

The focus is to utilize questions as an opportunity to engage the Jacks & Jills in the practice of public speaking in every aspect of our programming, starting with Age Group Activities in every Age Group category. The list below is not meant to be an exclusive list of questions but intended to provide guided suggestions; question variety and vocabulary used should be augmented/modified/advanced based on the age/maturity of the age group and specific activity. While every Age Group Activity may not be conducive to 3-5 minutes spent, the ask is that the activity host moms minimally try to incorporate1-3 questions/per 1-3 Jack/Jill participants to end the activity with presenting their response to the impromptu answer. Jacks & Jills should be coached to answer the question using a complete sentence, adding descriptive words, and timing them to keep each response to 1 minute or less.

SAMPLE QUESTIONS

- Was today's activity fun? Informative? Which one and how so?
- Jack & Jill activities must meet a certain thrust or theme; What thrust do you think today's activity met?
- What was your favorite part/aspect/component of this age group activity?
- What did today's activity teach you that you didn't know before you got here today?
- Please share one thing about one of your Jack or Jill friends that is interesting that the rest of us may not know.
- Do you have an interest or skill that made your participation in today's activity easier or made you more interested in the activity?
- Please provide one suggestion of what we (host moms) could have done differently to make this activity better for you!














MONICA JOSEPH
